



The theme of the [8<sup>th</sup> National Evaluation Capacities \(NEC\) Conference](#) is ***“Responsive Evaluation: For Government, For Inclusion, For the Future.”*** This underscores the importance of sharing progress and lessons learned in strengthening national evaluation systems, their role in achieving the SDGs and other development goals, and how new technologies and approaches in evaluation can facilitate the achievement of the SDGs. The Conference will take place in Beijing, China, from 14<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> October 2024. The first three days (14<sup>th</sup> -16<sup>th</sup> October) will be dedicated to the main conference, followed by a two-day post-conference training workshop (17<sup>th</sup> & 18<sup>th</sup> October 2024).

Session proposals are welcome and should be targeted at the primary audience of the 2024 NEC conference, **government officials from national and sub-national institutions** directly and indirectly engaged with evaluation and public policy, including central planning and finance ministries, sectoral ministries, evaluation units, national statistical agencies, supreme audit institutions. Other evaluation stakeholders, include the **civil society, academia, private sector, UNDP and UN agencies and partner staff** engaged in supporting national governments on evaluation, governance and/or the SDG agenda.

## Session Guidelines

1. Session topics should be linked to the overall conference theme and/or the three strands of [2024 NEC](#).
2. Session design should primarily focus on the needs of government participants, although session participants may come from a range of evaluation stakeholder groups.
3. Session moderator and panelists/speakers should include a good mix of stakeholder groups especially from the government and/ or other stakeholder groups. All panels should have a gender balance.
4. Session presentations should include practical examples of interest, experiences, best practices, issues and challenges relevant to fellow practitioners with potential to trigger a good discussion on the topic.
5. Presentations should be short, in the conference PowerPoint template (to be shared), visually attractive, convey key messages, and be made available with links to additional resource materials in advance of the conference. These will be made available to the participants during the conference and on the 2024 NEC website following the conference.
6. Presentations by speakers/ panelists should not exceed 10 minutes. Maximum 12-15 slides. Slides should illustrate ideas - not the full script; and illustrations should be simple and easily understood. No commercial messages are allowed.
7. It is strongly encouraged that speakers/panelists represent both the global South and the global North and achieve gender balance.

8. Anticipated number of participants per session is between 100- 150.
9. Simultaneous interpretations will be available in English, Chinese, French and Spanish during sessions.

<b>Session Description (250 Words):</b>	
<p>Diagnostic tools are crucial to inform initiatives for the development of evaluation capacities of governments, civil society and evaluation professionals. They present a consolidated description of strengths and weaknesses, highlighting areas for improvement and further consolidation. This session will discuss how different diagnostic tools can be adopted and how they can inform the establishment of responsive national monitoring and evaluation systems, focusing in particular on the cases of INCE and MESA.</p> <p>The INCE is a tool developed in partnership by 37 organizations in Latin America that focuses on creating spaces for peer learning and collaboration for the development of NES. The MESA tool was developed by the GEI to allow countries to conduct an overall country M&amp;E ecosystem diagnostic and inform country strategies for strengthening national M&amp;E systems and practices. The two instruments, INCE and MESA are complementary tools that allow its users to identify gaps and opportunities to strengthen monitoring and evaluations system and culture in their countries.</p> <p>In this session, we will explore the INCE and MESA tools and hear from the government representatives on how they have used these tools to inform their NES strategies. Participants from Latin America, Pacific and Africa will share their experiences in using these diagnostics tools to create a better understanding of the existing country M&amp;E systems and facilitate the planning and monitoring of NES strengthening actions. Additionally, the main challenges related to the application of the diagnostics in their respective regions and countries will be identified, along with the strategies implemented to overcome them and the best practices that allow for peer-to-peer learning.</p>	

The representatives of INCE and MESA will briefly present each tool and take note of improvement proposals from the countries. They will also identify actions to advance the complementarity between INCE and MESA.

**Expected session outcome, key message, and takeaways (100 Words):**

The most effective decisions to strengthen NES are based on consensus processes and a solid diagnosis. Learning about the experiences of the countries represented on the panel will motivate attendees to apply tools like INCE, MESA, or similar ones in their respective countries. Meanwhile, the representatives of MESA and INCE are confident in identifying areas for improvement in these tools to continue expanding their application and enhancing their complementarity.
